- Integrated Education & Training (IET) and Integrated English Literacy and Civics Education (IELCE)
- Entrepreneurship Development and Implementation Models

- 2. Examples and resources to assist in operationalizing the specified area
- 3. Facilitated discussions in small group breakouts to network with other states and discuss the real-world implications and options for implementation

As we address the many requirements under WIOA, it is important for states to have reliable information on requirements, the opportunity to ask questions, and the opportunity to network with other states. The NTI will provide the structure and forum to facilitate this interaction within the context of the specific areas identified above.
